Happy New Year to all,

I hope you made some time in between your holidays to do some summer hunting; it's a bit of a hard time to chase deer as the bush is usually dry and noisy. The stags have velvet and the hinds have new little ones to look after, but if you are just after some BBQ meat then a yearling will do just fine. I got out late December and took our pet dog out for his first hunt, he coped reasonably well with the heat and we managed to get a spiker. The dog was not too impressed with the rifle shot though, hopefully he gets used to it, I must admit he was a pretty good companion as I usually stalk alone and he kept behind me pretty well.

The Wild Animal Recovery Operations (WARO) is very contentious and there is massive opposition to it particularly from the hunting fraternity. Of Course 1080 is still as contentious as ever, I see in 2009 the South Island had 282,000 ha 1080'd vs North Island 95,000 ha, if there are 5 deer/km and 5% by kill 9,000 deer just got wiped out. I hate to imagine how many native species also succumbed to 1080 from these drops.

The Branch AGM will be on March 10th please come along and support the branch, we need as many people along as possible, you will need to be a current financial member to have voting/speaking rights. If you want to be on the committee let me or one of the current committee members know and come along to the AGM.

Please remember when on the Range that safety is paramount, if there are more than 2 different shooting parties there someone needs to assume Range Officer. The Range Officer will ensure that Range & basic firearm rules are followed.



2. GREATER WELLINGTON REGIONAL COUNCIL BALLOTS

- (i) WAINUIOMATA & ORONGORONO WATER CATCHMENTS These catchments are normally closed to the public. The hunting will play a part in controlling animals in the water collection area and will help to improve water quality. Ten hunting blocks are available for four periods of five days. To enter the ballot, hunters (only one form per person) should obtain an information pack (including a ballot entry from) by sending a cheque, \$5 non-refundable, to 'Wainuiomata Hunting Ballot', Greater Wellington, PO Box 40847, Upper Hutt. Those successful in the ballot will be required to pay a further fee of \$20 for each five-day period. Ballot entries must be received by 12 noon, on Monday February 15th 2010. The ballots will be held on Wednesday February 17th 2009. The winners of the ballots will be notified by mail on Friday February 19th 2009. For further queries contact Joanne Clifford-Marsh on 04 526 3144 or joanne.clifford-marsh@gw.govt.nz
- (ii) EAST HARBOUR REGIONAL PARK DEER HUNTING The hunting will play a part in controlling animals in the park, and also provide an opportunity for recreational deer hunting with a designated deer hunting area. Hunting of deer is available for nine periods of three days each, with one balloted hunter and a nominated partner allowed in the designated area at any given time. To enter the ballot, hunters (only one form per person) should obtain an information pack (including a ballot entry form) by sending a cheque, \$5 non-refundable, to 'East Harbour Deer Hunting Ballot', Greater Wellington, PO Box 40847, Upper Hutt. Ballot entries must be received by 12 noon, on Monday February 15th 2010. The ballots will be held on Wednesday February 17th 2010. The winners of the ballots will be notified by mail on Friday February 19th 2010. For further queries contact Joanne Clifford-Marsh on 04 526 3144 or email her on joanne.clifford-marsh@gw.govt.nz
- (iii) MANAGED PIG HUNTING Greater Wellington regional Council is giving the opportunity for members of the public to undertake pig hunting in the East Harbour Regional Park. Permits will be issued for a five-month period each year 1 May to 30 September 2010 (dates inclusive). There will be no restriction on the numbers of permits issued. The hunting will play a part in controlling animals in the park, and also provide an opportunity for the recreational hunting of pigs within designated hunting areas in the Northern Forest Block. Permits for non-firearm use will be issued on application. Dog registration number or microchip numbers are required prior

DOC UPDATES

1. ROAD THROUGH MOLESWORTH STATION OPENING THROUGH TO EASTER - The Acheron Road through Molesworth Station is to open to the public for 14 weeks from Monday 28 December 2009, staying open slightly longer than usual to include Easter. The opening of the road is dependent on road, weather and fire risk conditions. There is no fee to travel on the road. Anyone planning to make the road trip should first check the road is open as it can close at short notice due to weather-related conditions. Calls can be made to the DOC South Marlborough Area Office 03 572 9100 or people can ask at the visitor centres in the region. The area is often very dry in summer and care must to taken to avoid starting fires. As it is a working farm public access is restricted to roads and areas open to the public.

3. WELLINGTON CONSERVATION MANAGEMENT STRATEGY REVIEW ON HOLD - The drafting of the Wellington Conservation Management Strategy (CMS) has been put on hold. The Department's National Office is undertaking further work on the content and roles of CMS's at a national level to ensure consistency around the level of detail included in these documents.

The current Wellington CMS was due to expire in 2005, but an extension has been granted to allow for a review to be completed. At this stage a preliminary draft CMS for the Wellington region is available for viewing.

HELI-HUNTING/SUBMISSIONS REQUIRED

1.NZDA'S POLICY PAPER - HELI-HUNTING

- NZDA is opposed to the practice of 'heli-hunting', as it defines that activity on all public lands.
- Heli-hunting is defined by NZDA as the 'carriage of hunters involved with the searching for, shooting or immobilising and recovery of wild animals, where such carriage of hunters does not allow opportunity for fair chase of wild animals.'
- NZDA supports the use of helicopters for well-managed and legitimate Wild Animal Recovery Operations (WARO) as defined in conditions of current WARO Concessions granted by the Department of Conservation.
- NZDA supports the reasonable use of helicopters for transport, by recreational hunters, hunting guides and their clients, for access to defined, pre-determined landing sites or zones.
- NZDA is in principle supportive of guided hunting. However, it is NZDA National Policy to 'strenuously oppose commercial exploitation of the wildlife and natural resources of New Zealand, wherever and whenever such action is deemed to jeopardise, restrict or conflict with the public usage thereof, or to be contrary to sound conservation practice'.
- NZDA believes heli-hunting constrains public usage of wild game animals and wild places. We assert that it is a male biased harvest which does not contribute to herd management. It impinges on the availability of trophy animals for the public, and seriously diminishes the 'quiet enjoyment' of our backcountry by hunters, trampers, climbers and other backcountry user groups.

2. DOC'S PAPER ON HELI-HUNTING WITHIN PARTS OF AORAKI/MOUNT COOK NATIONAL PARK

Enclosed in the mail to branches and available electronically on request:

DOC's draft background paper setting out the factual matters that would need consideration should the department and the Canterbury/Aoraki Conservation Board propose an amendment to the Aoraki/Mount Cook National Park Management Plan (2004) to allow for some heli-hunting within the park. In a revised form, following this 'seeking comments' phase, this report would be used to accompany what would likely to be quite a brief paper setting out any actual plan amendments. A decision to seek, or note, an amendment to the plan will be made in February 2010, in consultation with the Canterbury Aoraki Conservation Board.

Public comment is now being sought to ensure the paper is factually correct and that all relevant issues that would best inform any proposed plan amendment have been included. Comments should be sent to Canterbury Conservancy, DOC, attn AMCNPMP by February 1st 2010 via any of the following: ppalmer@doc.govt.nz Fax 03 365 1388 or Private Bag 4715, Christchurch Mail Centre 8140.

The draft background paper includes:

- An overview and aircraft considerations during the development of the Aoraki/Mount Cook National Park Management Plan (2004)
- Heli-hunting within the context of wild animal control within the park
- > Ethical, safety and other visitor interaction issues
- Implications for other aircraft use
- Consistency with National Parks Act 1980 and General Policy for National Parks and consistency with other national parks
- A list of the parks and National Park Management Plan provisions with comments, ie Kahurangi, Nelson Lakes Arthur's Pass, Westland/Tai Poutini, Mt Aspiring and Fiordland
- 3. DOC'S TERM FOR HELI-HUNTING AS IN THE BACKGROUND PAPER has become shorthand for what could be called 'guided helicopter-based recreational hunting'
- **4. NZDA SUBMISSION ON HELI-HUNTING** WITHIN PARTS OF AORAKI/MOUNT COOK NP a submission in response to the background paper Heli-hunting within parts of Aoraki/Mount Cook National Park is under consideration currently and as soon as the national office has something this will be forwarded to branches and members to assist with more submissions.

5. GRANTING OF HELI-HUNTING LICENCES ON PUBLIC LANDS FROM FEBRUARY 2010

NZDA is very concerned about this pending proposal and has written to members of parliament who take an interest in issues affecting recreational hunting in New Zealand's backcountry.

The issue is that at a meeting between DOC, NZ Conservation Authority and other NGOs it was advised that applications for concessions to undertake heli-hunting on certain public lands were issued.

The letter outlines NZDA's concerns, the outcomes we seek and what we have asked the MPS targeted in this letter to do.

- 1. NZDA SUBMISSION ON THE AHB BOVINE TB STRATEGY REVIEW Because there are so many unanswered questions about eh AHB strategy, its excessive expense, whether an unresearched experiment like this will work, NZDA requests an independent ministerial enquiry on these matters. This submission includes NZDA's concerns including:
- > AHB intentions to drastically change its strategy
- > AHB good progress towards its self imposed target has been stalled since June 2007
- Major costs of the AHB proposal
- No AHB phase out evident in spite of nearly achieving its goals
- Live stock transport major issue
- Hidden regional council costs
- Very high opportunity costs compared with alternative investments
- Cheaper alternatives not considered
- Cost benefit analysis biased by self interest and spurious arguments
- Massive killing power of present aerial 1080 drops
- Recreational hunters will be very adversely affected
- Recreational hunting areas to be blitzed by AHB's proposed 'eradication' strategy
- Proof of the feasibility of AHB's 'eradication' strategy needed
- Independent proof required that BTB is present in backcountry wildlife
- Can BTB be eliminated from wildlife?
- **2. GEM LAKE TENURE REVIEW PRELIMINARY PROPOSAL -** NZDA strongly supports the proposal because of the significant amount of land being repurchased, the landscape and scenic qualities of the land being purchased, and its ability to support big game hunting (deer and possibly wild pigs) should WARO operators be prohibited as they usually are on open uplands in central Otago.
- <u>3. NZDA'S OPPOSITION TO THE POTERITERI WILDERNESS</u> The proposal was put forward by Federated Mountain Clubs in their bulletin, June 2008. This wilderness would include the whole of Lake Poteriteri and its watershed and is further to the east towards public access points than the South West Cameron Remote Experience Area, another possible wilderness.

NZDA has opposed the wilderness based on:

- Wilderness's adverse impact on recreational hunting:
- the large numbers of deerstalkers using the areas
- forming of a Poteriteri Wilderness would add significant additional costs for DOC.

Poteriteri as a long narrow lake provides motorboat access along the valley something that is less expensive than helicopter access. It also provides landing sites for floatplanes. NZDA opposes the lake being included in any future wilderness area.

MESSAGE FROM THE NATIONAL PRESIDENT (As emailed to branch presidents, and posted to branches December 14th.

'Some of you may have already been made aware of the fact that the National Executive has decided to terminate the services of our National Advocate, Hugh Barr.

Hugh has contributed some fine efforts to our advocacy role and has helped to achieve good results for the Association.

However, over the last two years the Executive has frequently had to deal with certain aspects of our Advocate's behaviour and attitudes that have portrayed our Association in a poor light.

Hugh has been spoken to about this on numerous occasions and advised that if the situation continued his contract would be reviewed.

The Executive is aware that branches were not informed of this situation; however, the issues faced were such that in the interests of protecting Hugh's (and the Association's) reputation, the issues needed to be discussed in-committee. As such, they will remain confidential to the Executive and Hugh.

Despite these discussions and warnings, the behaviours continued. Furthermore, other organisations have informed us that they have found it increasingly difficult to work with Hugh.

In light of this, and in the best interests of advancing the Association, the Executive was left with no option and the contract has been terminated. The termination has been carried out according to the terms and conditions of the contract, and Hugh will continue as our Advocate until the end of January 2010. It is my hope that he will continue to advise us on a case-by-case basis after that time.

We have many other talented people with expertise in diverse areas that we can contract under a case-bycase basis along with Hugh, which means that our Association will not be left without advocacy.

The Executive believes that this decision is in the best interests of our Association in this ever-changing hunting climate.'

ILL TRAMPER LEFT BEHIND BY COMPANIONS – NZ HERALD (JAN 25 2010)

An ill tramper was left by his companions in the Richmond Ranges near Nelson yesterday in a breach of common sense, police say.

The 24-year-old Nelson man became ill and began vomiting about two hours from Starveall Hut, Senior Sergeant John Maxwell, of Nelson police, said.

He called his parents who called emergency services, but the rest of the eightstrong tramping party continued on their journey, leaving the man by himself.

The man was taken to Nelson Hospital by helicopter and treated for dehydration, Mr Maxwell said.

At least one of the other trampers should have stayed with the man, he said.

"There's far more chance of people surviving in groups of two or more than on their own," he said.

RESCUED - THANKS TO TEXT MESSAGE - NZ HERALD (FEB 6 2010)

Two trampers have been lifted by helicopter from an unstable slip face in the lower North Island's Ruahine Ranges today - texting their coordinates so their rescuers could fly straight to them.

The pair, a man and a woman, were traversing the slip face when they realised it was unstable and they were unable to moved either forwards or back, said Inspector Anaru George of police central communications.

Cellphone coverage in the area was limited. It was not good enough for them to ring out but just good enough for them to send and receive texts, although some were garbled.

They sent a text message "stuck on a slip face, were ok but not safe" to a friend, who contacted police about 10am.

Police were able to text the trampers in order to identify their exact location and nature of their emergency, Mr George said.

They were able to supply their GPS coordinates, he said.

A helicopter was able to pinpoint the trampers quickly and winched them from the unstable slip face about midday.

They were extremely well equipped which made their extraction from their predicament very easy, Mr George said.

Normally the biggest problem was finding trampers in trouble, but not in this case, he said.

"They had everything going for them, except knowledge of the terrain that was falling away from under them."

In one of the final text messages to the police central communications centre, the trampers wrote "Thank you so much for your help. We are sorry to have ruined your saturday".

LOST TOURIST RESCUED THROUGH TEXTING FAMILY IN GREECE BY WAYNE THOMPSON - NZ HERALD (FEB 8, 2010)

A tourist lost on Mt Ruapehu on Saturday night used his cellphone to text his family in Greece to guide searchers to him.

Marios Symeonidis, 30, was found at 10am yesterday on the Bruce Road up the mountain.

He had become separated from a friend at 6.30pm during what was meant to be a short walk, said Senior Sergeant Marty Edghill of the Central Communications Centre.

He was not equipped for a night in the open. After three hours he texted his family in Greece saying he was lost but unharmed.

At one point, he told them he could see a police vehicle on the mountain but could not reach it because it was on the other side of a swiftly flowing stream which he was following.

His family contacted the Greek emergency services as text messages came in and the information was passed on to police in New Zealand.

"It was a good option to use his cellphone," said search and rescue controller John Pitchford. "He was not injured but he was hungry - he ate all of the chocolate and muesli bars out of my pack and most of my water. He is happier now he is back with his mate and they have driven off to catch the ferry to go to the South Island."

FIRE AT KIWI SANCTUARY - NZ HERALD (FEB 8, 2010)

The Department of Conservation (DOC) is stepping up its vigilance around a kiwi sanctuary on the West Coast after a fifth deliberately lit fire was discovered overnight.

The fires were lit near the Okarito Kiwi Sanctuary, about 25km north of Franz Josef. The sanctuary is home to the rarest kiwi species, the rowi.

The first four fires were spotted from a helicopter about 3am yesterday, with the largest spreading over an area of about 500sqm.

A helicopter with a monsoon bucket, firefighters and DOC staff tackled the blazes.

Another suspicious fire was discovered overnight by the side of State Highway 6 and staff had stepped up their vigilance as a result, DOC programme manager Julian Tovey told Radio New Zealand.

"Obviously with another one last night we're on the game now, just trying to watch out really."

It was still unclear why the fires had been lit.

"There's always people with grudges against DOC for different reasons," Mr Tovey said.

"It could just be hunters trying to get some areas of regrowth so deer come in and then they can have a hunt later on. So there's different theories on why, but we've no strong leads at the moment."

One of the fires yesterday had encroached within the boundaries of the northern end of the sanctuary and could have put the rowi at risk.

Nesting had finished for the birds and hopefully they would have been able to escape the flames, Mr Tovey said.

Staff would this week assess whether the rowi population or environment had been affected.

The total rowi population is about 350.

The area had seen other arsons in the past, normally about this time of the year when manuka trees were dry and could catch fire easily.

'I OWE MY LIFE TO WINSTON' BY ANNA LEASK - NZ HERALD (NOV 29, 2009)

An elderly hunter who was shot in the chest says he would not have survived without the quick-thinking mate wrongly blamed for the incident.

Nigel Ross, 69, spoke of his ordeal from his bed in Waikato Hospital's intensive care unit on Friday, with wife Janet by his side.

Ross and his lifelong hunting partner, named only as Winston, were leaving Lake Taupo Forest, 25km southeast of the resort town, when he was shot late on Wednesday evening.

"We were walking to our vehicle, walking along the forest park boundary. We had torches and I had a head lamp to find our way to the vehicle," he said. "Two shots were fired. One hit the gravel beside me and the other shot caught me in the shoulder."

He suffered a fractured shoulder, collapsed lung and internal injuries.

Winston enlisted a group of people to help get Ross into the back of their ute.

"Winston was on the cellphone getting the ambulance to meet us at the end of the road where we would exit the forest. All thanks to Winston for getting that organised," Ross said: "I was bleeding heavily. I was lying in the back of the ute being bounced along for I don't know how long."

Ross was rushed to Taupo Hospital's emergency department.

"They did a marvellous job to stabilise me...we were running short of time. They simultaneously mobilised the helicopter to whisk me through to Waikato Hospital for them to go to work on me and save my life, I'm pleased to say."

Police said a local man hunting in the area with a companion had been identified as the shooter. He is co-operating with police but no charges have been laid.

Ross said the bullet that hit him remained lodged in his body. He will undergo further surgery to remove it.

"I was very, very lucky... (the bullet) missed all my vital organs and nerves. It was not a nice thing to happen, but it could have been a lot worse."

He said he owed his life to Winston and was upset by initial reports blaming his mate.

"There's no question. I owe my life to Winston. I will be eternally grateful to that man."

Ross remained in intensive care yesterday in a stable condition.

LOST HUNTER SURVIVED ON RAW EEL - NZ HERALD (FEB 9, 2010)

A hunter who became lost in Waikato bush on Saturday lived on raw eel before being rescued late yesterday afternoon.

Jared Costello, 40, of Auckland, was hunting with a friend in Pureora Forest Park, west of Tokoroa, when they became separated on Saturday morning, Sergeant Phil Bell of Waikato police search and rescue said.

The friend returned to the bush that afternoon, having recruited another person to help search for Mr Costello. They fired shots to get his attention but could not find him.

On Sunday morning they emerged from the bush and raised the alarm.

A group of local search and rescue volunteers began hunting for Mr Costello and on Sunday were joined by others from surrounding areas taking the total to nearly 70 searchers, plus an air force helicopter.

He was found safe at a road on the park's outskirts yesterday having made his way out of the forest.

"We'd found footprints in the bush and where he'd made camp Saturday night. Mr Costello told us he had become separated from his friend early on and lost his pack on the second day which search teams had recovered," Mr Bell said.

"He'd done the right thing by making his way down from the rugged bush by following a stream, from a preventative perspective if he had been carrying a map to go with his compass he may have been able to navigate his way back to his camp but we're all just happy he's been found safe and well."

Mr Costello told rescuers he'd been eating raw eel and did not recommend it as a culinary delight. - NZPA
