Range attendance book:

A range attendance book has been installed at the range. Mountain poison drop targets pest wallabies - NZ Herald By Alanah May Eriksen

The Department of Conservation is making its first attempt to eradicate the Dama wallaby species, introduced almost 140 years ago, as the pest threatens native plant species.

About 370 plastic bait stations carrying 20,000 pellets of the cyanide-based pesticide Feratox have this week been laid over 800ha on Rotorua's Mt Ngongotaha. The mountain has the biggest known isolated population outside Kawau Island in the Hauraki Gulf. Other large isolated populations are in the Te Puke and Pyes Pa area.

The Dama wallaby, one of six known species in the country, was introduced on Kawau and around Lake Okareka in Rotorua by former Governor Sir George Grey in 1870. The wallabies soon spread around the Bay of Plenty and were first recorded in the Waikato region in the 1950s.

The furry marsupial, weighing up to 8kg and measuring about half a metre tall, feeds on grasses, manuka and kanuka, kamahi, mahoe, hangehange, pigeonwood, supplejack, rangiora and broadleaf.

DoC area manger Nicki Douglas said many people were unaware the pest lived in New Zealand.

"Most of the time they're nocturnal so when people see them when they're driving they ... just look like a big possum."

She said it was hard to tell how many Dama wallabies were in the region. Lake Tarawera residents often complained to the department about the pest in their backyards.

"I've had a few people from the Tarawera community say ... they've never seen so many wallabies as they have in the last two years. So they are definitely increasing in number. [And] they don't really have any predators ... There isn't really anything around that's big enough to kill them."

The DoC operation, conducted with the Bay of Plenty and Waikato regional councils, is part of a three-year project to control the pest and eradicate it from Mt Ngongotaha.

Ms Douglas said eradication of the entire species was a long way off but if it could be kept away from vegetation in forests such as Te Urewera National Park, the Whirinaki Forest Park and the Kaimai Ranges, it would be "good outcome".

DoC is also working to introduce permits for people wanting to take wallabies out of the area. It wants to be able to prosecute people if they do not have a permit.

DoC workers will next week return to the site to count how many wallabies the poison has killed and dispose of the carcasses.

Ms Douglas said they had wanted to keep the stations clear of dead wallabies but a trial of the bait in February and March at Waikite Valley showed the more human activity there was in the area, the less likely the animal was to take the bait. DoC would wait a week before going back to the site.

Feratox, used as an alternative to 1080 in Tasmania for the control of possums and wallabies, carries a risk to humans and animals such as dogs, so farmers in the area are being asked to keep their stock away from the stations.

MOTHER AND SON ESCAPE AFTER 200M FALL - NZ HERALD

A three-day tramp in Arthurs Pass National Park ended painfully for a woman who fell 200m down a slope and her son, who jumped after her.

Both survived yesterday's incident and were picked up by rescue helicopter after setting off their locator beacon, One News reported.

Andrea Short suffered a dislocated thumb and bruises after falling down a slope covered with rocks and ice.

Her son, David Short, said he watched in horror as his mother disappeared. "She was gone in a matter of seconds and the first thing that went through my head was this might be it for mum."

But his mother was able to break her fall.

"I was stuck sort of upside down, pack in the ground holding me there and trying to wave to David to tell him I was all right."

Mr Short said he cannot explain why he jumped after her.

"I have no idea what possessed me to do that. She shot out of sight and I didn't think, I just jumped," he said.

Ms Short attributed her survival to their beacon. It took just an hour and a half for the helicopter to find them.

"Arthurs Pass turned horrible in the space of 10 minutes," she said.

HUNTERS SUFFER GANG ORDEAL - BY HELEN MURDOCH - NZ HERALD

A Whakatane hunter has described how he was confronted by seven armed Mongrel Mob members as he emerged from the bush in Urewera National Park.

"They all had knives - if they'd pulled out the knives, I would have shot them," said the 23-year-old of the incident in the Waimana valley last month.

He has vowed never to hunt in the Ureweras again. The hunter, who does not want to be named, was at the end of a four-day trip from Whangarei when the incident occurred. Exiting the national park via a carpark at the Waimana access, the two hunters were approached by the seven men wearing leather vests with "Taneatua Mongrel Mob" patches and carrying knives at their waists.

"They asked what we had been doing, and if we had any meat for them," the hunter said. "They asked about our guns and our dogs in a threatening manner - they said they wanted a gun like that.

"They obviously wanted our guns and our dogs, and I was wondering whether I would have to shoot them to get home safely. They even said it was their land - although it belongs to the Department of Conservation."

After 10 minutes of intimidation, the seven got into a white Pajero and drove off, saying the hunters had better be gone when they came back or they would be doing some "taxing".

Still waiting for their ride home, the two hunters hid in bush and, five minutes later, the seven men returned.

They were yelling "Where's my f***** guns" and "We know where you are".

Fortunately, they left soon after, the hunter said.

"I could have shot one of these men to save myself but who would have ended up in prison? It's disgusting that we can't go into our national park and feel safe. This was my friend's first time in the Ureweras - he's an experienced hunter and he's never come across anything like it."

He reported the incident to Whakatane police, and said other hunters needed to be aware of the potential risks.

Senior Sergeant Bruce Jenkins said such incidents involving hunters were not common.

Andy Bassett, Conservation Department area manager for Gisborne and Opotiki, said it was the first time he had heard of such a confrontation. "I would urge people who come under any kind of intimidation to contact the police," he said.
